University Report

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1. INTRODUCTION

In the 2020/2021 academic year, the University of Florida (UF) continued to pursue its mission of education excellence while facing the greater challenges of a global pandemic. While classes resumed and faculty, staff, and students adapted to changing conditions, the International Center found new and innovative ways to support our international programs and serve our global community. Throughout, we continued to serve UF's broader global mission and are proud to be a leader in fostering international understanding and developing a network of students and scholars at home and around the world.

This report represents the fourth year of documenting international activity and presents our global footprint for the 2020/2021 academic year. Similar to past reports, the data summarize a considerable volume of international activity, and continues to be testimony to the university's commitment to international research, education, and international exchange.

The report documents the university's international partnerships, the investment into faculty development programs, an estimate of the extent international research, the number of international visitors working and studying at UF, the number of international students, the extent

of applications for graduate programs from students worldwide, the university study abroad programs, our efforts dedicated to internationalizing the curricula, and a summary of where our faculty, students and staff are travelling. This year, we have added information about our international alumni, showcasing the global reach of our graduates.

The data represent a snapshot of international activity captured in August 2020. For many categories, the numbers fluctuate; for example, the number of formal agreements with foreign institutions changes daily as new partnerships are introduced and others are expired. For some data, such as for international graduate applications and the number of international students, the report captures Fall numbers only to avoid double counting and redundancies.

The activities reported in this document demonstrate how international efforts at UF contribute to a fundamental university goal to prepare our students to better navigate the increasingly complex

challenges of a globalized world. The intent is to showcase and highlight the extent and scope of UF's international activity in one inclusive report. As a top ranked, R1, public university, our faculty engage in research and international collaborative activity that is, by its sheer number, a challenge to document. Their scholarship and classroom activity impacts international content daily and, with

Now more than ever, the UF International Center embraces its global mission as we plan a way forward in pursuit of international engagement in a postpandemic world.

almost 5,000 faculty and more than 200 research and education centers, bureaus, and institutes, documenting their international scholarly activity is difficult. For this reason, this report cannot be comprehensive of all international activity; however, it provides a benchmark from which we can begin to measure our global reach. Indeed, every indication suggests the Gator Nation extends substantially to the wider global community.

The University of Florida connects to the world's best international universities and institutions through formal partnerships supported by UF's International Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs). These agreements facilitate research among faculty; enable faculty and student exchanges; protect intellectual property; and serve as a basis for ensuring ethical best practice. The relationships that may flourish as a result of these agreements is an important aspect of our internationalization efforts.

The MOU database is dynamic. On a regular basis, the International Center enters into new agreements, updates existing partnerships, and terminates those that are expired or no longer relevant. The data tabulated in this report represent the UF Agreements for the 2020/2021 academic year.

The International Center manages 374 international MOUs. The majority fall under two broad categories of Agreements – Cooperative and Reciprocal.

- At UF, most MOUs are Cooperative (73%). The Cooperative MOUs or Agreements are as
 diverse as the needs of our faculty. These collaborative partnerships provide a framework
 to pursue collaborative activity and do not represent a legal relationship. Often, they start
 as a one-to-one collaboration with a UF partner and over the length of the agreement
 result in meaningful scholarly partnerships.
- Almost one quarter of all International MOUs are Reciprocal Agreements, which are a true
 exchange program MOUs where students from each institution spend time at the host
 institution as a non-degree, seeking

• There are a few International MCUs to cover combined and dual degree programs, transfer programs from other institutions, or special agreements among universities to accommodate unique circumstances for student exchanges.

- The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS) manages the most international MOUs (25%).
- There are 272 Cooperative International MOUs and the highest percentage (32%) of MOUs are managed by IFAS.
- There are 94 Reciprocal MOUs and the majority are within the Warrington College of Business (40%) and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (33%).
- Since 2017, the number of International MOUs have decreased (Cooperative by

21% and Reciprocal by 17%). However, for the last three years, the numbers have been relatively stable.




Figure 2-2: International MOUs 2017-2021

- UF International MOUs represent collaborative activity in 82 countries.
- The greatest number of International MOUs are with Brazil and China; whereby, each have ten percent of all MOUs.

- 272 Cooperative MOUs in 74 countries
- 13% (the majority) are with institutions in Brazil
- 8% are with institutions in China

- 94 Reciprocal MOUs in 29 countries
- 12% (the majority) are with institutions in Australia
- 11% each with institutions in China and with Germany.

The geographic diversity is generally a reflection of the size of the unit (Table 2-2).

- IFAS has the largest global footprint with 94 active international MOUs in 40 countries.
- The Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Business also have a relatively geographically diverse set of partners. (The list of all agreements is included in the Appendix.)

3. UF'S GLOBAL RESEARCH FOOTPRINT

Institutional Review Boards (IRB): An Indicator of Global Research Capacity

Documenting the international research conducted by faculty, staff, and student at UF is monumental. There is no consistency in labeling research as international unless it physically conducted outside of the US. One indicator of our research footprint can include applications to UF's Institutional Review Boards (IRB) oversight of human subjects research.

The IRB is charged with protecting the rights and welfare of participants in clinical trials and other human subjects research studies. UF IRB offices reviews and approves all research involving

human subjects to ensure the welfare and rights of research participants are protected as mandated by federal and state laws, local policies, and ethical principles. As such, UF faculty, staff, and students must provide the IRB with a detailed plan of how their research will ensure the safety and welfare of any people who participate in their research project. When the research is conducted outside of the U.S., faculty, staff, and students are required to submit their research protocol that is compliant with the regulations in the U.S. and in the country where the research will take place.

The database that stores the applications for IRB approvals can serve as one indicator of the extent of international research at UF. It is not a comprehensive list and does not include research activities that do not involve people directly in the research methodology. It would not include studies that:

- Collect physical data,
- Reflect an international research collaboration among colleagues,
- Rely primarily on secondary data,
- Conduct primarily library or archival research, or
- Are exploratory studies intended to train students.

Within the above parameters, several colleges (e.g., Colleges of Engineering and the Arts) are underrepresented in this summary. As such, these data can only partially highlight the scope of UF's global research.

Exempt Approved and Approved IRB Studies¹

- 656 international IRB studies
- 481 (73%) studies submitted to the UF IRB for review, qualified to be Exempt Approved status from further review by the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). To qualify the study can meet one of the following criteria:
 - Research is conducted in an established educational setting and involves instruction.
 - Research using educational tests, surveys, interviews, or observations of public behavior.
 - Research that does not impose risk or impact on any subject.
 - Secondary research involving access of identifiable data.
- 175 (27%) studies had undergone full IRB review.

IRB Studies by College

 A little more than half of all international studies requiring IRB review are from three colleges: Liberal Arts and Sciences (29%), Medicine (14%), and the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (14%).



Figure 3-1. Number of International IRB Studies by Region




- UF Faculty, students and staff are conducting research in 127 countries.
- The majority are in China, Haiti, and Brazil.
- 30%, the majority, of all international

IRB studies are in Latin America and the Caribbean. Of those, a large number are in Haiti, Brazil, Mexico, and in Peru.

- 18% are in countries in Sub Saharan Africa, mostly in Ethiopia, Ghana and Nigeria.
- 18% in Europe, the majority in the United Kingdom.
- 16% are in Eastern and Southeastern Asia, mostly in China, South Korea, and Thailand.

4. INTERNATIONAL VISITING SCHOLARS

- 922 International Visiting Scholars at UF.
- The majority, 90% are Research Scholars.
- The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences hosts the most Visiting Scholars (41%).
- International Visiting Scholars at UF are from 72 countries.

International Visiting Scholars are vital in supporting the global mission of the University of Florida. International Visitors promote cultural exchange, enrich international research, and connect UF to leading universities in the world. This year, UF's visiting scholars faced the additional challenge from the COVID-19 pandemic, international travel restrictions, and limited access to U.S. Embassies and Consulates for visa processing. Some of our visiting scholars had to return to their home country earlier than planned, while others were not able to travel and have a physical presence on campus. The impact of the pandemic will


Figure 4-1: Number of Visiting Scholars by Year

continue to make a difference in our numbers of visitors throughout our next academic year. The number of scholars at UF for the 2020/2021 academic year, dropped substantially and continues a

downward trend (Figure 4-1). This academic year UF hosted 922 International Visiting Scholars. As expected, the effects of travel restrictions and embassy closures account for the 36% decrease from last year (Figure 4-1).

Visiting scholars fit into one of five categories:

 Professor - Teaching is the primary function; more than 50% of their time devoted to teaching. Maximum duration is five years.



- 2. Research Scholar Research is the primary function; more than 50% of their time devoted to research. Maximum duration is five years.
- 3. Short Term Scholar Program allows research and teaching. Maximum duration of sixmonths
- 4. Student Intern International students completing an internship which fulfills an educational objective towards the completion of the student's degree from their home institution. They must engage in a minimum of 32 hours per week of structured internship activities and may take part-time UF courses. The maximum duration of their program is 12 months.

International Visiting Scholars by College

- The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences hosts 41% of all International Visiting Scholars to UF.
- College of Medicine hosts 15% of Visiting Scholars, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences hosts 14%, and the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering hosts 10% of all visiting scholars. No other unit or college hosts more than 10%.
- 82% of all student interns are with the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.




Country of Citizenship of International Visiting Scholars

- International Visiting Scholars at UF are from 72 countries.
- Three quarters of all international visitors are from nine countries, while only 25% are from 62 countries in total (Figure 4 -2).
- The majority, almost one third are from China.
- International scholars from Brazil make up the second most frequent country from which UF's visiting scholars originate.
- Visiting scholars, as Professors are from Austria, Brazil China, Colombia, France, Germany, Mexico, Taiwan, and Turkey.
- Half of all Research visiting scholars are from China (36%) and Brazil (13%).
- The majority of Short-term scholars are from Brazil (19%) and Pakistan (19%).
- Of 11 Student interns, three are from Brazil, two from Colombia and the remaining six are from El Salvador, Japan, India, Malawi, Nigeria, and Uganda.

Figure 4-2: International Visiting Scholars by Citizenship








5. INTERNATIONAL STUDENT APPLICATIONS

International Applications by Type of Program

- 17,917 international students applied for degrees to the University of Florida.
- 31% of all applications for bachelor's programs.
- 43% of applications to master's degree programs.
- 21% of applications for doctoral programs.
- 5% of applications for Certificate and Other programs.

- University of Florida received 17,917 international student applications from 168 countries.
- The majority of international applications are for UF's master's programs (43%).
- The Colleges of Engineering and Liberal Arts and Sciences receive the greatest number of international applications.
- More than half of all international applications are from China and India.




Student Profile

- 55% of all applications to UF are from male students and 45% from female (Figure 5-2).
- The male to female ratio among bachelor's degree applications is approximately even.
- For graduate programs (master and doctoral), the male to female ratio is 59% male and 41% female.

 The Specialist in Education degree, Certificate programs and non-degree programs have a larger ratio of female to male student applications.

- The Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Nursing have a greater percentage of international applications for their undergraduate programs.
- Most colleges receive the largest proportion of international applications for their master's programs.

 Excluding the UF Colleges who only provide graduate education (i.e., Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, Dentistry, Veterinary Medicine), the Colleges of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Public Health and Health Professions, and Liberal Arts and Sciences have the highest percent of applications for their doctoral programs.




Figure 5-3: Number of International Applications by College and Degree Type


International Applications by Citizenship

- More than half of all applications are from China and India.
- 75% of all applications come from only ten countries China, India, South Korea, Brazil, Canada, Venezuela, Taiwan, Saudi Arabia, Iran, and Colombia. 25% come from 158 different countries.

- UF receives international applications for graduate programs (Master, Doctoral, Specialist in Education and Graduate Certificate) from 148 countries.
- The top three countries from which students apply for graduate programs are China, India, and South Korea (Table 5-3).
- International applications for undergraduate programs (bachelor's degrees and undergraduate certificate programs) come from 150 countries.
- The top three countries from which students apply for undergraduate programs are China, India, and Brazil (Table 5-3).

6. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

- 5,607 registered international students from 130 countries.
- 3,627 international students currently enrolled in classes.
- 1,980 UF graduates registered in Optional Practical Training (OPT).
- 85% of all international students (including OPT) are enrolled in a graduate program.
- 48% of all international students (including OPT) are in the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering.
- 61% of all international students are male.


Each year, the International Center welcomes and assists students from around the world to help them make a smooth transition to student life at the University of Florida. The data reported here reflect UF's submission to the Open Doors Report to the US Department of State, Bureau of Educational, and Cultural Affairs.

Number of International Students Registered for Classes and OPT³

During the Fall 2020 semester, across all units, colleges, and schools there are 3,627 current international students enrolled in classes at

- Additionally, 1,980 students are participating in the Optional Practical Training (OPT).
- Of all students enrolled in classes, 79% enrolled in graduate programs; 20% in a bachelor's degree and less than .5% in a non-degree program.
- Of all OPT participating students, 95% have completed a graduate degree.

³ Optional Practical Training provides international students an opportunity to seek "temporary employment for practical training directly related to the student's major area of study." The student can use it during or after program completion. Precompletion OPT is always part-time and can be used at any time during the degree program. Post-completion OPT is full-time and is granted only after graduation or completion of the degree program.

International Students by College and Degree

- The highest number and percent of international students are enrolled in the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering.
- Of all current international students, 38% are engineering students, 20% Liberal Arts and Science students, and 12% are in the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.
- Of all OPT students, two thirds (65%), are engineering students, 11% are business students.
- Most international students in undergraduate degree programs are enrolled in engineering and in Liberal Arts and Sciences.
- 65% of current international master's students and 25% of all current international doctoral students are in engineering.
- The majority of international doctoral students (28%) are in Liberal Arts and Sciences, 25% of international doctoral students are in the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering, and 19% are in the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

International Students: Home Country

- International students enrolled at UF, including OPT, are from 130 countries.
- One third of all international students (including OPT) are from China (34%), and almost one third from India (31%). A substantial number of international students are from South Korea (3%), Brazil (3%), Saudi Arabia (2%), Venezuela (2%), and Taiwan (2%). The remaining 23% are from 127 other countries and there are not more than two percent from any one of those countries.
- The 3,627 current international students (not including OPT) at UF are from 124 countries. Almost half (47%) are from countries in Eastern and Southeastern Asia (38% are from China). One quarter of non-OPT international students are from Central and Southern Asia (the majority from India). (Table 6-3).
- Of the 1,980 students registered for OPT, more than half (54%) are from India, and more than one quarter (28%) from China.
- Outside of China and India, there are a substantial number of international students from South Korea, Saudi Arabia Brazil, Venezuela, Taiwan, and Iran (Table 6-3).

Graduate Students

- In Fall 2020, there were 2,873 non-OPT students enrolled in graduate level classes, including master's, doctoral, specialist degrees and JDs. The students are from 109 countries.
- The majority of graduate students (61.1%) are from China and India.
- There were 1,177 international students (non-OPT) enrolled in master's programs from 69 countries. Most from China and India.
- The 1,690 (non-OPT) international students pursuing a doctorate (including a JD) from 92 countries, and similarly, half are from China and India (Table 6-5).

Optional Practical Training (OPT)

- 1,980 international students who have graduated and decided to seek temporary training and/or employment and registered for the OPT program.
- 35% of all international students are participating in OPT.
- International students participating in the OPT program come from 77 countries; a little more than half (54%) are from India and more than one quarter (28%) from China.
- Of all OPT enrolled students, two thirds graduated from the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering.
- The Colleges of Business and Liberal Arts and Sciences also have sizeable numbers of OPT students.

- Significantly fewer students graduating with a bachelor's degree pursue OPT; only5% have graduated with a bachelor's degree.
- The majority (70%) of all OPT students have graduated with a master's degree.
- 25% of OPT students graduated with a doctorate.

7. STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS

For Study Abroad Services, the 2020-2021 Academic Year required endless planning for a multitude of logistical scenarios. The Study Abroad team spent a significant amount of time analyzing program feasibility and the financial implications of attempting to run programs during the pandemic. As expected, participation dramatically decreased over the past year, and only 276 were able to study abroad, with the majority of those students studying in Europe and Asia. We also saw an increase in virtual international opportunities, with around 50 UF students participating in either a virtual international internship or program. This is a trend we expect to continue as more students look for financially accessible ways to internationalize their degree.

- 276 students studied abroad.
- Of all students who graduated, 2,294 or 14% had at least one study abroad experience.
- The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences had the highest percentage of study abroad students (33%).
- About two-thirds of study abroad students are female
- The majority of study abroad students (89%) are undergraduate students.
- Almost three quarters of students participated in a summer program.
- Almost one third of study abroad students are white (31%); 18% are Hispanic or Latino; 8% are Asian; 3% are Black or African American, 40% did not respond.
- Students travelled to 23 countries. Spain, China, and the United Kingdom were the most popular destinations.

additional challenges on study abroad the past year, the overall trajectory of study abroad at UF over the past few decades has not faltered. The International Center expects to see more return to normalcy over the 2021-2022 academic year, and plans to continue diversifying study abroad programs, and the students who participate in them. Our plans for the upcoming year include greater outreach to underrepresented students and an increase in programming to non-traditional destinations. And as we move forward in years to come, UF Study Abroad Services plans to continue the mission of providing transformative global learning opportunities that challenge students to embrace differences and foster the intercultural competency to succeed in today's interconnected

While the pandemic has certainly placed

- With ongoing Covid 19 travel concerns, only 276 students participated in a study abroad. Pre pandemic, the number of study abroad students was approximately ten times higher (2,637 in 2018, pre-covid).
- One third of all students who participated in study abroad are enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.
- The Warrington College of Business also had a relatively high number of students enrolled in study abroad.



- Thirty students from the Warrington College of Business participated in an internship study abroad. All were undergraduate students.
- The nine students who had an internship experience from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences were all undergraduate students.
- The ten students from the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering who had a research focus to their study abroad experience were undergraduate students.

Program Destinations

- UF students participated in programs in 23 countries for their study abroad experience.
- A little more than half travelled to Europe, mostly to Spain and the United Kingdom.
- One third travelled to Eastern and Southeastern Asia, almost all to China, Taiwan, and South Korea.
- Students travelling to Latin America visited Brazil, Costa Rica, and Bolivia.
- Students studying abroad to North Africa travelled to Israel, Morocco, and Jordan
- Six students travelled to Kyrgyzstan.
- One Student travelled to South Africa
- The College of Business sent a little more than half their students to European destination: however, a substantial number traveled to Eastern and Southeastern Asia (mostly to China and a few to South Korea and Taiwan).
- The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences sent almost 60% to countries in Europe. A little more than one quarter to Eastern and Southeastern Asia (8 to China, 8 to Taiwan, 6 to South Korea).
- The College of Health and Human
 Performance sent five students to Eastern
 Asia (3 to Taiwan and one each to China and South Korea).
- The College of Journalism and Communications sent a majority of their study abroad students to Eastern Asia (split relatively evenly to China, Taiwan and South Korea).

Figure 7-2: Study Abroad by Region



Graduating Students and Study Abroad

- In the 2020/21 Academic Year, 17,015 students graduated from all programs at the University of Florida. Of those, 2,294 or 13.5% had participated in at least one study abroad program during their time at UF.
- Of the 2,294 students who had at least one study abroad experience, 77% were undergraduates, 18% master's degree graduates, and 5% doctoral students.
- 16% of all undergraduates, 10% of master's students, and 7% of doctoral students had at least one study abroad experience prior to graduation (Table 7-4).

International Scholars Program

The International Scholars Program (ISP) is a commencement medallion program open to all undergraduate students. ISP allows students to develop a global mindset and acquire in-demand skills by integrating international coursework, interdisciplinary perspectives, digital literacy, and experiential learning opportunities. To graduate with the International Scholars designation, the student must meet four requirements:

- 1. Four courses of international themed coursework
- 2. One international experience (e.g., study abroad) or two semesters of a foreign language
- 3. Be engaged in the various international campus life programs available throughout the year
- 4. The student must complete the capstone *e*-portfolio program that features their accomplishments at UF and abroad in an online forum
- The majority of students, almost two thirds, enrolled in the International Scholars Program
 are in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The percentage from the College of Liberal
 Arts and Sciences is substantially higher than from any other unit. Similarly, the highest
 number of students who graduated with an ISP designation are from Liberal Arts and
 Sciences (Table 8-5).

9. TRAVEL REGISTRY

- Faculty, students, and staff made 334 trips.
- Faculty, staff, students, and alumni travelled to 77 countries.
- Almost three quarters of all trips were to support research.
- Half of all trips were by faculty and almost forty percent by staff.




Figure 9-1: Number of Trips by UF Faculty, Staff, and Students

University of Florida faculty, staff, and researchers travel internationally as part of their official UF duties. For example, they may travel to attend conferences, collect field data, engage in outreach activities, collaborate with partners, participate in meetings, recruit students, etc. Prior to Covid, the number of trips on behalf of UF ranged from four to five thousand each year. Due to a full year of Covid-19 restrictions, the number of trips by UF faculty, staff, and students dropped significantly and UF's travel fell to 335

trips. As in previous years, more than fifty percent of all travel is in May, June, and July (Figure 9-1). In 2018/19 pre covid UF faculty, staff, and students accounted for over 4,000 trips.

- 334 trips by UF faculty, staff, students, alumni, and affiliates.
- In 2018/29 pre-covid, faculty made 4,342 trips on behalf of UF.

Travel by College/Unit

- Approximately one third of all trips by UF faculty, students, and staff are from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. 91% of those trips were to support research.
- 19% of all UF trips from the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and 87% of those were trips to support research.

• Of the 28 trips by faculty, staff, and students from the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering, a little more than half were to support research and the remaining half were distributed across the range of possible trip purpose.

- 71 % of all trips were to support UF research.
- Of all faculty trips, 65% to support research, 14% travelled to teach abroad, 8% to attend a conference.
- Of all staff trips, 25% for research, 30% to provide technical assistance or participate in a medical mission. 20% for partnership building and site visits.
- Of all student travel, 87% was for research, 6% to provide technical assistance or participate in a medical mission.

Figure 9-2: Who is Travelling?






10. UF INTERNATIONAL ALUMNI

The University of Florida supports a large alumnus of more than 450,000 former students. Because

UF has a sizeable number of international students and the university's reputation is global, UF's graduates extend the gator nation worldwide. Tracking graduates is a challenge and the summary presented here cannot be comprehensive. The accuracy of tracking where UFs graduates live is a function of the strength of each of our college's alumni network. As a result, some colleges can report proportionately larger numbers than those reflected by graduation data. Additionally, some colleges have a larger percentage of international students and therefore, their international alumni reflect that enrollment trend.

- The UF Alumni Association reports on 9,315 alumni living outside of the U.S.
- UF alumni report on alumni from 157 countries.
- The majority of alumni are in China (20%) and India (20%).
- Of the international alumni data, 83% graduated with a graduate or professional degree and 17% with a bachelor's degree.

The summary documents both UF's international students who may have returned to their home country after graduation and U.S. students who work and live abroad.

 The Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering is reporting the most international alumni – 37%.
